The campaign used comic animations and bright graphics to highlight the wide range of health services available in the after hours period, helping people decide the best option for medical care and taking pressure off our busy hospitals.

The campaign is now a finalist in the national PRIA Golden Target Awards, which will be announced on November 13.

Another NWMPHN community engagement activity was also recognised this week at the IAP2 awards, with our Dying Well Community Engagement Forum receiving both a Judge's Encouragement Award and a Sustainable Community Development Certificate.

The Dying Well Forum brought together a broad cross-section of community members to define what dying well meant to them and to create an action plan for making their vision a reality. NWMPHN is now implementing several of the forum's recommendations.

NWMPHN CEO Adjunct Associate Professor Christopher Carter said the organisation has been working hard to find new and innovative ways to engage and inform the community.
