Home Medicines Review for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people

What is a Home Medicines Review?

A Home Medicines Review (HMR) helps you, your care-coordinator, doctor and pharmacist, manage your medicines. Your care-coordinator or doctor may arrange a pharmacist to visit you at home. At the visit the pharmacist will help you get the most out of your medicines. You can invite your care-coordinator or aboriginal outreach worker to attend the visit.

How can a Home Medicines Review help me?

- Learn more about your medicines. For example, what they do and the best time to take them.
- Identify any possible side effects or medicines that do not work well together.
- Identify any medicines you no longer need.

What will happen?

- 1. Your doctor or care-coordinator contacts your choice of regular pharmacist, or a HMR pharmacist.
- 2. Your care-coordinator or outreach worker arranges a suitable time for the pharmacist to visit you.
- At the visit, the pharmacist together with your care-coordinator or outreach worker, will help you with your medicines and medical devices (inhalers, blood pressure monitors and blood glucose monitors).
- 4. The pharmacist will send a report to your doctor.
- 5. You will then meet with your doctor and care-coordinator to discuss the report.
- Your doctor will develop a medicines plan. This will be shared with your regular pharmacist.

A Home Medicines Review may be appropriate if you:

- · take five or more medicines, or
- take more than 12 doses of medicines per day, or
- have had changes to your medicines in the last three months, or
- take medicines that need monitoring, or
- think you are suffering a side effect, or
- are worried your medicines are not working, or
- find it difficult to manage your tablets, or
- see more than one doctor, or
- have been discharged from hospital in the last four weeks

Would a Home Medicines Review help you?

Speak to your doctor or care-coordinator about one today.

- A Home Medical Review is free.
- The visit with the pharmacist will take about 45 minutes.
- The visit is usually at your home, so the pharmacist can check the storage of all your medicines.

However, if you prefer, the pharmacist can meet with you somewhere else.

This could be at your Aboriginal health service or in a park.
