Emergency Services

- Emergency services are for very serious health problems or sickness.
- Serious health problems are things like trouble breathing, chest pain, bleeding that doesn't stop or broken bones.
- Telephone Triple Zero (000) for an ambulance or go to your nearest hospital.

Interpreters

- You have the right to an interpreter for all health care.
- Your health provider should arrange an interpreter.
- Telephone 131 450 if you need an interpreter.
- Interpreters have special training and what you talk about is always kept private.
- Family members can come with you to the doctor, but you should use an interpreter to talk about your health.

Family Doctor

- A family doctor is called a **general practitioner** or a GP in Australia.
- Having one regular GP for your whole family is a good idea.
- It is important for your whole family to have a full health check (**Refugee Health Assessment**) in your first year living in Australia.
- Not all doctors will do the **Refugee Health Assessment**, so ask your doctor if they will do it, or choose a doctor who can.
- If you have a caseworker or a **Refugee Health Nurse**, they can help you pick a doctor.

Refugee Health Nurse

- **Refugee health nurses** can help you with all your health needs.
- Refugee health nurses work in community health centres.
- You can make your own appointment with a **refugee health nurse**.
- Ask your caseworker, if you have one, or GP to find your local **refugee** health nurse.

Immunisation

- Immunisation is what happens in your body after you have a vaccination.
- Immunisation protects you against disease.
- Immunisation is important for all children and all adults.
- Ask your GP about what vaccinations you need.
- It will take a few appointments to be completely immunised.
- Your child must be fully immunised to get Centrelink payments and have full access to school or childcare.

Mental Health

- Refugees who come to Australia have had hard experiences in their own country or on their way to Australia.
- Lots of people feel sad or worried, have trouble sleeping or bad dreams, or have low mood.
- There is help available from professionals who work in this area.
- You can talk to your GP about how they can help you if you are worried about your mental health.

Maternal and Child Health

- Maternal and child health nurses support parents and their children's health and development.
- Maternal and child health is for children up to six years old.
- Telephone your local council to make an appointment.
- Or ask your caseworker, GP, or **refugee** health nurse.

Dental Care

- Dental check-ups are free for refugees at community dental services.
- Remember to let the dental service know that you are a refugee when you make an appointment.
- Book in for an appointment as soon as possible after coming to Australia as dentists can be very busy.
- Ask your GP, **refugee health nurse** or case worker about how to make a dental appointment.

Community Health

Community health centres offer health care services mainly for people on a low income. These services can include dental services, doctors, and allied health professionals such as physiotherapists, dietitians, and podiatrists.

Below is a list of community health centres that have Refugee Health Nurses. You can ask to see a Refugee Health Nurse at any of these services.
