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# Support in person or by phone

Did you know most people do not use their inhaler correctly?

An Australian study found 6 out of 7 confident inhaler users thought their technique was correct when it wasn't.

Build your inhaler skills with a free specialist education service:

#### Asthma Australia Referral Service

This service provides support for people over 3 years old who have asthma.

You can <u>book an online appointment with an</u> <u>asthma educator</u>. Alternatively your GP can ask an asthma educator to contact you.

For free phone support call 1800ASTHMA (1800 278 462) during business hours.

The service has a call-back facility, and TIS National interpreters are available.

#### **Community Asthma Program - cohealth**

The <u>Community Asthma Program</u>.provides free asthma education and support for children (1- 17yrs) with asthma or wheeze. An asthma nurse educator works one on one with families to manage asthma.

#### Home medicine review by a pharmacist

Your GP can refer you to an accredited pharmacist who will visit your home to help you with asthma management. This includes checking inhaler technique, medicine management and correct storage.

#### Talk to your GP

Your doctor has a range of ways to help you or your child to manage asthma.

If you need more support book a longer appointment so that you can discuss all the options with your doctor.

#### How-to videos for inhalers - National Asthma Council Australia

It's easier to learn how to use an inhaler or nasal spray when someone shows you. With this in mind the National Asthma Council of Australia has produced a pile of short videos demonstrating how to use all sorts of tools for controlling the condition. These allow parents to teach good technique to children – or allow children to learn directly.

# Apps to help manage asthma

There are several apps available to help you manage your child's asthma, or to help your child self-manage. They include:

#### Asthma First Aid app

The <u>Asthma First Aid app</u>, by Asthma Australia, is the go-to tool for an asthma emergency. It covers first aid and the ability to review each of the four first aid steps.

#### **Kiss My Asthma**

Kiss My Asthma, also by Asthma Australia, is an app for, and developed by, young people. It features access to its user's asthma action plan and can track symptoms, severity and frequency of attacks. This makes it easy to provide accurate information to GPs or specialists.



#### Air Smart - Asthma Australia

<u>AirSmart</u> provides daily information on air quality, so users can avoid breathing hazards when planning activities.

#### Asthma Buddy website

Asthma Buddy, by the National Asthma Council Australia, is a mobile-only website. Patients and carers can add personalised asthma action plans, including details of day-to-day meds. It also helps identify if the condition is getting worse, and provides advice on what to do.

#### **EPA AirWatch**

<u>EPA AirWatch</u>, hosted by Victoria's Environmental Protection Authority, is a web page that shows the level of pollutants in the air at monitoring sites across the state. This information can be used to plan activities to avoid exposure to asthma triggers.

#### **Melbourne Pollen**

<u>Melbourne Pollen</u>, by the University of Melbourne, is an app that tracks hay fever symptoms to figure out which pollen types are to blame. The alert notification system lets users know when each pollen level in their area is high.

#### Vic Emergency

The State Government's <u>Vic Emergency app</u> and website provides warnings for possible thunderstorm asthma conditions.

### Royal Children's Hospital asthma video series

The hospital has produced an excellent series of short videos to help parents better understand and manage childhood asthma. They include:

The video explains what causes wheezing in preschool children, how the diagnosis of asthma can be made in this age group, and how to care for young children with asthma or wheeze.
