



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

What to do if you identify a cold chain breach ^

A cold chain breach has occurred if:

- vaccine storage temperatures have been outside the recommended range of 2°C to 8°C. It excludes fluctuations up to +12°C, lasting ≤ 15 minutes, which may occur when stock taking or restocking refrigerators. All deviations below 2°C are considered a cold chain breach, or
- · vaccine is exposed to light (if removed from packaging and exposed to direct sunlight or ultraviolet light, including fluorescent light).

When a cold chain breach incident occurs:

- 1. Follow the cold chain breach reporting protocol .
- 2. Isolate the vaccines and place a sign on the vaccine refrigerator; "Cold Chain Breach, Do not use or discard vaccines until
- Store at 2°C to 8°C if possible.
- 4. Do not use or discard any vaccines until you have discussed the breach with the Victorian Department of Health Immunisation Program who can provide advice on what to do with vaccines affected.
- 5. Download the data logger to assess the duration of the breach and the extent of temperatures reached.
- 6. Assess number of vaccines affected and assess practice records to identify any vaccines exposed to a previous breach.
- 7. Report the cold chain breach and await advice and further instructions:
 - Complete a cold chain breach report form , attach all required documents and email to immunisation@health.vic.gov.au.
 - For privately purchased vaccines or other medications stored in the refrigerator, contact the manufacturer directly.
 - For COVID-19 vaccines, see COVID-19 Vaccination for instructions.
- 8. Determine the cause of the breach and, where possible, address this to reduce the risk of the event recurring.
- 9. Take steps to minimise risk of further cold chain breaches. See National Vaccine Storage Guidelines Strive for 5 2.

Be prepared for a potential breach ^

- Have written procedures to follow in the event of a cold chain breach
 ☐ or power failure ☐.4
- · Have a cooler and cold bricks always available. Store ice bricks in a domestic freezer.
- Do not transfer vaccines to a cooler unless you know how to pack a cooler correctly and have a maximum minimum. thermometer to record the temperature of vaccines in the cooler. Freezing is the most common reason for vaccine damage and loss in Australia. See recommendations on coolers and how to pack a cooler [2],
- Consider access to a pharmacy or a vaccination provider who can store your vaccines in a monitored purpose-built refrigerator.
- If your practice receives notice of a planned power outage, or you experience frequent power interruptions, consider calling the power service provider and requesting a power generator as a backup power source.
- If you have had, or are having a power outage, you can check with the power service provider for the estimated length of the outage.
